PRODUCTION NOTES

SYNOPSIS

It's time for spring cleaning. Christy and a maid tackle the clutter in the rooms of Christy's house. Junk is everywhere. Lazy is asleep in an easy chair. Me First keeps stepping in the way of the cleaners. Envy is lurking in a green, moldy corner. Worry is huddled in a blanket and rocking furiously in a rocking chair. Self-Pity's black robe is obscuring the lamp's light. Gluttony has taken over the kitchen. Greed, Anger, and Pride are hiding in the closet. None of the "clutterers" want to leave. Even Christy isn't sure she wants to get rid of them at first. But through the maid's gentle guidance, she finds the courage to confront each one. Originally written for a women's retreat, this play would work well for any women's meeting or banquet — or even for a Sunday morning drama.

COSTUMES

CHRISTY — Casually dressed in sweats or clothes suitable for housecleaning. Wears rubber gloves.

HELPER — Professional cleaner, dressed in coveralls with "Helper Agency" printed on back.

LAZY — Sloppy robe and slippers, hair in curlers or messed up.

ME FIRST — Fashionable clothes, dressed up to go out.

ENVY — Dressed in green, touch of green makeup on face. Covered with a green sheet or blanket.

WORRY — Wrapped in a blue sheet or blanket, looks distressed.

SELF-PITY — Dressed in black, perhaps in a big cape.

GLUTTONY — Big, loose clothes stuffed with pillows; a huge white bib at the neck.

GREED — Luxuriously dressed, lots of jewelry, fur stole, etc.

ANGER — Dressed in red; spiked hair.

PRIDE — Meticulously dressed in a suit.

PROPS

Large black cloth; broom; mop; bucket; cleaning supplies; rubber gloves; telephone and phone book; clipboard; pen; several pop cans; donuts, bag of potato chips and assorted

other boxes and bags of cookies, candy and junk food on the kitchen table; cigarette package and liquor bottle (also on kitchen table); cardboard box; large "Super Christian" badge (made with gold paper and blue ribbon); bill marked "Paid in Full."

SOUND EFFECT

Doorbell ringing or knocking.

SETTING

Christy's house. Divide the playing room into two main areas: the living room and the kitchen.

For the living room, you will need an easy chair, a rug in the corner of the room, a rocking chair, and a large table containing a lamp that is turned on and a telephone and phone book.

The kitchen area needs a table and chair. The table should be covered with the above-mentioned food, cigarettes, and liquor bottle.

It is helpful if your playing area contains two doors. One may be used for the outside entrance, and the other for the closet. The closet door should be shaped like a heart or have a heart on it. If you decide to put the closet On-stage where it is visible to the audience, line the interior with gold foil. If your playing area doesn't have doors, the outside entrance and closet may be Off-stage — e.g., behind the curtains at opposite sides. Cardboard doors may be constructed.

AT RISE: All characters except CHRISTY are On-stage when the play begins. In the living room area: LAZY sleeps in the easy chair, ME FIRST stands behind her, ENVY is slouched on the rug in the corner, WORRY sits in the rocking chair, SELF-PITY stands beside the lamp. A large black cloth is draped over SELF-PITY and the lamp, hiding them. In the kitchen area: GLUTTONY sits slumped at the food-covered kitchen table. In the closet are GREED, ANGER, and PRIDE. All characters freeze until they speak. CHRISTY enters. She is carrying a broom, mop, bucket, and cleaning supplies. She drops them wearily in the middle of the living room area.

CHRISTY: *(Looking around)* This place is a mess! I don't even know where to start. There is so much clutter here I can't even see the furniture. Help! I need help. I know! I'll call that new maid service! It would be worth a week's salary to get this place cleaned up. *(She walks to telephone and picks up phone book. Looks through book, dials number, and listens.)* Leave a message at the tone! I can't do that! I need help now — before I lose my resolve to get this place in shape. *(Looks through book again.)* Let's see now. Who else can I call? Here's another one — "The Helper." Hmmm. I like their motto — "I can do everything through him who gives me strength." *(Philippians 4:13 [NIV])* And they even give free estimates. Well, it's worth a try. *(Dials and listens.)* Oh, hello. Yes, I wondered if you might come by and give me an idea about how much it would cost to have my house cleaned? Today? Oh, that's great! The address is #7 The Way Road. OK. I'll be waiting. *(Hangs up phone as doorbell rings or knock is heard. CHRISTY opens door.)*

HELPER: *(Carrying clipboard and pen)* Good day. Helper Agency at your service.

CHRISTY: How did you get here so fast? *(Looks out door.)* Where's your car?

HELPER: Oh, I didn't come by car — we have a special method

1 of transportation. Well, let's get right to work. Your name
2 please? (*Writes on clipboard.*)

3 **CHRISTY:** Christiana Goodman, but just call me Christy.

4 **HELPER:** (*Shakes hands with CHRISTY.*) Hello, Christy. Just call
5 me Helper.

6 **CHRISTY:** Well, Helper, I sure am glad you could come today.
7 As you can see, I *do* need help.

8 **HELPER:** Yes, I can see that. When did you last clean your
9 house?

10 **CHRISTY:** Oh, I clean every spring — except last spring. I
11 broke my leg, so I couldn't do much for six weeks, and by
12 then it was summer and too nice to stay inside and clean.

13 **HELPER:** So it's been two years since you cleaned this place?

14 **CHRISTY:** Two years — yes, that's right. No, wait! Two years
15 ago — that was the year Angela was born. Well, you
16 couldn't expect me to spring clean with an infant, now
17 could you?

18 **HELPER:** So you didn't clean two years ago?

19 **CHRISTY:** I guess not.

20 **HELPER:** Three years ago?

21 **CHRISTY:** Yes, I must have cleaned then — although I was
22 pretty busy that spring. That was the year I took the class
23 at the university. But I must have done *some* cleaning
24 then.

25 **HELPER:** Oh well, never mind. It doesn't really matter about
26 the past. What matters is the present and the fact that
27 you are going to get to it now! And I think I know where
28 to start. Right over here! (*Moves to chair and tries to wake*
29 *LAZY up.*) Lazy! Lazy! Wake up!

30 **LAZY:** Hey, what's the big idea waking me up? It's only nine
31 o'clock. I usually sleep in until eleven or twelve.

32 **HELPER:** We're trying to get some spring cleaning done here,
33 and I'm afraid you'll have to leave so we can make some
34 progress.

35 **LAZY:** Leave! Are you kidding? It's nice and warm in my soft,

1 cozy chair. Why...I'd have to get up to leave!

2 **HELPER:** Yes. That's the idea.

3 **CHRISTY:** Are you sure Lazy has to go? We have such a nice

4 time in the morning...just sitting around...enjoying that

5 second cup of coffee.

6 **HELPER:** Well, if you're serious about cleaning up in here,

7 Lazy will have to go first.

8 **LAZY:** Come on, give me a break. I'm too tired — you can't ask

9 me to leave today. How about tomorrow? Let me get a

10 good night's sleep. Then I'll be ready to leave tomorrow.

11 **HELPER:** Sorry, but I really think it's better if you go now.

12 **CHRISTY:** Lazy is right. Can't we wait until tomorrow? I

13 mean, if she goes, who will watch the soaps with me this

14 afternoon?

15 **HELPER:** Soaps? We'll worry about those when we clean the

16 bathroom.

17 **CHRISTY:** Not those soaps. *The* soaps! You know — “Weeks of

18 Our Lives,” “All My Grandchildren”....

19 **LAZY:** Oh yeah, we can't miss those today. We have to find out

20 if Laura's ex-husband's girlfriend is really pregnant.

21 **CHRISTY:** And does Mark really have amnesia or is he just

22 trying to get away from Melanie?

23 **LAZY:** And will Marie keep her baby?

24 **CHRISTY:** (*To HELPER*) I'm sorry, you really can't ask Lazy to

25 leave today.

26 **HELPER:** Well, if that's the way you want it. Remember, *you*

27 called *me*. I just thought you wanted to clean your house,

28 and we really can't do anything as long as Lazy is here.

29 **CHRISTY:** Well, I really do want to make an improvement

30 here. Lazy, I'm sorry, you'll have to leave.

31 **LAZY:** Christy, have you flipped?

32 **CHRISTY:** No, I just want you to go now.

33 **LAZY:** Well, I know when I'm not wanted. See you around,

34 kiddo. Guess I'll go to the donut shop until you get over

35 this cleaning thing. I can easily kill an hour or two there.

1 *(She leaves.)*

2 **CHRISTY:** There. Lazy's gone. Now what? *(ME FIRST steps*
3 *between CHRISTY and HELPER.)*

4 **HELPER:** Well, it's hard to know what to do next. I'm having
5 trouble getting past Me First.

6 **ME FIRST:** *(Snobbish voice)* Christy, who is this funny-looking
7 person, and what are you doing in that dowdy outfit? I
8 thought we were going to spend the day having fun — I've
9 got it all planned.

10 **CHRISTY:** I'm sorry, Me First, I can't today. I promised myself
11 I'd get a start on my spring cleaning. I phoned the Helper
12 Agency to come by and give me an estimate of the cost to
13 clean this place. This is their agent.

14 **HELPER:** *(Extends hand.)* How do you do?

15 **ME FIRST:** *(Ignores hand.)* Well, I am not a happy camper, I can
16 tell you that! Christy, don't you remember we planned to
17 meet the girls for brunch at that fancy new restaurant
18 everyone is raving about? If we eat early, we'll have most
19 of the day to shop in those exquisite little shops at the
20 Galaxy Mall. Did you forget that today is their bi-weekly
21 "Once in a Lifetime Super Sale"?

22 **CHRISTY:** Oh, that's right! I forgot!

23 **ME FIRST:** Besides, you've been working too hard lately —
24 you deserve a break.

25 **CHRISTY:** Well, I *did* hear a doctor on TV say that you have to
26 take some time for yourself.

27 **ME FIRST:** Exactly! Here, take this designer bubble bath and
28 go have a nice, relaxing soak. We have time before brunch.

29 **CHRISTY:** Maybe you're right. And after shopping, wouldn't it
30 be fun to see that new movie everybody's talking about?
31 I've heard it's really good!

32 **ME FIRST:** Sure! After all, this is your day. We can do
33 whatever you want! Now, that's real happiness!

34 **HELPER:** *(To CHRISTY)* Doing whatever *you* want to do. Is that
35 really what happiness is to you, Christy?

- 1 **CHRISTY:** Well...no...I guess it really isn't. I'd really be happy
2 if I could get my house cleaned.
- 3 **HELPER:** Well, then, you'll have to ask Me First to go.
- 4 **CHRISTY:** (*Turns to ME FIRST.*) Look, Me First, you go on
5 without me.
- 6 **ME FIRST:** Christy!
- 7 **CHRISTY:** I've got lots to do here today, and I think I'll just
8 stick with it.
- 9 **ME FIRST:** (*Offended*) Suit yourself. (*She leaves.*)
- 10 **CHRISTY:** This is harder than I thought it would be.
- 11 **HELPER:** It's hard, but don't forget — I'm here to help you.
12 (*Moves to green corner.*) Wow! It must have been awhile since
13 you cleaned this corner. It's filled with green mold or
14 something. (*ENVY stands up.*) Envy! I should have known!
15 I'd recognize you anywhere.
- 16 **ENVY:** Helper! Why don't you just leave me alone? I'm not
17 hurting anyone here.
- 18 **HELPER:** Oh, but I'm afraid you are. You're messing up this
19 beautiful carpet. You'll have to go.
- 20 **CHRISTY:** Wait! Surely Envy doesn't have to leave? She goes
21 with me everywhere. When I visit my friends, she points
22 out the things they have that I need.
- 23 **ENVY:** That's right. Last week I showed her how wonderful it
24 would be to have a husband like Karen's. He helps with
25 the housework and he *even* changes diapers.
- 26 **CHRISTY:** Yes, and just yesterday you pointed out that if my
27 Ernest was a better money manager, we'd be able to go on
28 a Caribbean cruise — just like the Joneses!
- 29 **ENVY:** And don't I always tell you when Susan and Heather
30 have nicer clothes than you?
- 31 **CHRISTY:** Yes, and it's not fair! I haven't had a new dress in
32 months.
- 33 **HELPER:** I really think it would be best if Envy left.
34 Otherwise, you will never be able to see and enjoy this
35 carpet of joy and contentment.

- 1 **CHRISTY:** It's been a long time since I've seen it. I'd forgotten
2 how beautiful it is. I'm sorry, Envy. I'll probably really
3 miss you. (*HELPER leads ENVY out.*)
- 4 **ENVY:** You'll be sorry! You'll wish you had me back next time
5 you go visit Karen — you'll see!
- 6 **HELPER:** (*Turning back toward room*) What is that awful
7 squeaking noise? Doesn't that get on your nerves? How
8 can you listen to that all day?
- 9 **CHRISTY:** Oh, that's just Worry. She spends all day and all
10 night in my grandmother's rocking chair — "the chair of
11 peace," my grandmother called it when she gave it to me.
- 12 **HELPER:** When did you use it last?
- 13 **CHRISTY:** Oh, I never use it. Worry sits in it all the time.
- 14 **HELPER:** Well, I can see why she likes it so much. Worry is
15 just like rocking — it keeps you busy but gets you
16 nowhere! (*Turning to WORRY*) Worry, dear, would you mind
17 getting out of that chair? We need to give it a good
18 cleaning.
- 19 **WORRY:** (*Rocks faster.*) Sorry, I'm busy.
- 20 **HELPER:** Busy? But you're just sitting there — rocking.
- 21 **WORRY:** That's what you think. No one else seems to be
22 concerned about the way things are going around here. I
23 have to do *all* the worrying. It's a hard job, but someone
24 has to do it.
- 25 **CHRISTY:** That's true. She does help me with the worrying.
26 I'm afraid I couldn't get it all done by myself.
- 27 **WORRY:** Yeah, remember last week when Angela had that
28 runny nose and cough? I stayed up all night with you,
29 worrying that it could be pneumonia — or even lung
30 cancer! Poor baby!
- 31 **CHRISTY:** Yes, and remember the pain I had in my side
32 yesterday? You stayed with me all day, pointing out that I
33 might have appendicitis or an ulcer or worse.
- 34 **WORRY:** And I have so much to do when the children go to
35 school. I have to worry about whether or not they wore

- 1 warm sweaters. Will Susie eat her lunch or throw it in the
 2 garbage? Will that big bully pick on Billy again at recess?
 3 Why didn't the music teacher choose Susie for the solo in
 4 the spring concert? Doesn't she like her?
- 5 **CHRISTY:** (*To HELPER*) And I couldn't do without Worry when
 6 I'm working on the weekly budget. She reminds me that
 7 we'll never have enough money to pay all those bills. And
 8 what if Ernest loses his job? What if we had to move in
 9 with his mother?
- 10 **HELPER:** I can see you two spend a lot of time together.
- 11 **CHRISTY:** Together we can always think of something to
 12 worry about.
- 13 **HELPER:** As long as Worry is here, we'll never be able to dust
 14 off that chair of peace.
- 15 **CHRISTY:** Well, I would like to see it again. It's been several
 16 years...Worry, maybe you could just take a little break.
 17 You could go for a walk or something.
- 18 **WORRY:** Are you crazy? Go out for a walk?! Why, I could get
 19 my shoes dirty, or catch a cold, or get run over by a truck.
- 20 **CHRISTY:** Surely it's not as dangerous as all that.
- 21 **WORRY:** If you want to throw me out, that's up to you. If you
 22 want my death on your conscience for the rest of your
 23 life, what can I say? (*HELPER leads her out as she continues*
 24 *to mumble.*) Where did I go wrong?...
- 25 **CHRISTY:** What a beautiful chair!
- 26 **HELPER:** Why don't you try it out?
- 27 **CHRISTY:** (*Sitting*) The chair of peace — my grandmother
 28 knew how to live.
- 29 **HELPER:** (*Moving to lamp*) It's a little dark in this corner.
 30 What's wrong with your lamp?
- 31 **CHRISTY:** It works. See — the light is on.
- 32 **HELPER:** No, I can't really see the light. There is something
 33 black draped all over it. (*Pulls black cloth off lamp and SELF-*
 34 *PITY.*)
- 35 **SELF-PITY:** Go away and leave me alone. Can't you see I want

1 to be by myself?

2 **HELPER:** Self-Pity! You show up in the busiest places, but you
3 always want to be by yourself.

4 **SELF-PITY:** What do you know about me? Look at you! You've
5 got a fancy uniform. You get paid for the work you do.
6 Does anyone pay *me* for cleaning the house, cooking the
7 meals, washing the clothes? No way, buster!

8 **HELPER:** Surely it's not *that* bad.

9 **SELF-PITY:** Not only do I not get paid, I don't even get
10 thanked. Right, Christy?

11 **CHRISTY:** That's true, all right. All we hear is: "Mom, isn't
12 dinner ready yet? What are we having? Yuk! You know I
13 don't like meatloaf!" or: "Mom, did you wash my gym
14 clothes? Where are they?"

15 **SELF-PITY:** And Ernest *never* takes you out for dinner
16 anymore. He just flops in front of the TV and grunts if you
17 ask him a question.

18 **CHRISTY:** And it's not just at home that I'm taken for granted.
19 Look at the church. Do you know I have been a Sunday
20 school teacher for ten years and not once have any of the
21 parents said, "Thanks for taking time to teach my child."

22 **SELF-PITY:** And did anyone even notice when you vacuumed
23 the whole church last week? Or how about the day you
24 brought in that beautiful bouquet of fresh flowers?

25 **CHRISTY:** And they always expect me to stay and help clean
26 up whenever we have a potluck dinner.

27 **SELF-PITY:** I'm sick of it! I'm tired of being walked on all the
28 time.

29 **HELPER:** (*Takes CHRISTY aside.*) Hmmm...Christy, I thought
30 you did all of those things out of your love for your family
31 and for Jesus.

32 **CHRISTY:** Well, yes, I do.

33 **HELPER:** I think Self-Pity here is clouding your vision, just
34 like she's clouding the glow from this lamp of faithfulness.

35 **CHRISTY:** Do you really think so?

- 1 **HELPER:** I'm sure of it. But I've wrestled with Self-Pity
2 before. We'll have to sneak up behind her and put her out
3 together. It will take both of us.
- 4 **CHRISTY:** OK, let's do it. *(They seize SELF-PITY and start to push*
5 *her out the door.)*
- 6 **SELF-PITY:** *(To CHRISTY)* Are you going to let this stranger
7 tell you what to do? She's just using you, Christy.
- 8 **CHRISTY:** She's trying to help me.
- 9 **SELF-PITY:** You might think you're rid of me, but I'll be back!
- 10 **HELPER:** She's right, you know. She'll try to sneak in when
11 you least expect it.
- 12 **CHRISTY:** I'll be on my guard. Look at the lamp! It's glowing!
- 13 **HELPER:** The Lamp of Faithfulness will brighten the darkest
14 hour, Christy. *(Looking around)* Well, the living room looks
15 pretty good. Let's go into the kitchen.
- 16 **CHRISTY:** Do we have to?
- 17 **HELPER:** It can't be any worse than the living room.
- 18 **CHRISTY:** Don't be so sure.
- 19 **HELPER:** *(Enters kitchen. GLUTTONY is at table stuffing her face.)*
20 Gluttony! I should have known I'd find you here!
- 21 **GLUTTONY:** Christy! Where have you been all morning? You
22 must be starved!
- 23 **CHRISTY:** Not really. I had bran flakes, toast and juice for
24 breakfast.
- 25 **GLUTTONY:** *(Cracks up.)* Bran flakes! You're not getting health
26 conscious on me, are you, girl? Bran flakes! That's like
27 eating little bits of cardboard. Look — I saved you some
28 chocolate donuts and potato chips!
- 29 **CHRISTY:** Oh, they do look good!
- 30 **GLUTTONY:** It's a good thing I went to the store with you last
31 night. Did you know we were almost out of Oreos? And
32 the candy jar was empty before I filled it with the peanut
33 brittle we bought.
- 34 **CHRISTY:** I know. I was going to cut down this week.
- 35 **GLUTTONY:** Cut down? Girl, don't be so hard on yourself. You

- 1 have to eat to live. Or is it live to eat? Oh well, whatever.
2 Food is fun...Chocolate cake!
- 3 **CHRISTY:** Cherry pie!
- 4 **GLUTTONY:** Strawberry shortcake!
- 5 **CHRISTY:** My, oh my!
- 6 **GLUTTONY:** Hot fudge sundaes!
- 7 **CHRISTY:** Apple pie!
- 8 **GLUTTONY:** Buttery mashed potatoes!
- 9 **CHRISTY:** Piled sky high!
- 10 **HELPER:** Girls! Control yourselves. You're getting a little
11 carried away.
- 12 **CHRISTY:** You're right. I've got to take control of this kitchen.
13 Gluttony, help me get rid of this stuff. *(She starts packing*
14 *food in a box.)*
- 15 **GLUTTONY:** Get rid of it! Christy, you've flipped! But if you
16 really want to get rid of it, just pack it up and give it to
17 me. Hey, maybe I should leave you these cigarettes and
18 this bottle of sherry — you never know when you might
19 need them.
- 20 **CHRISTY:** No thanks!
- 21 **HELPER:** *(To CHRISTY)* You won't need them in your kitchen
22 of self-control. *(GLUTTONY leaves.)*
- 23 **CHRISTY:** I can't believe how much better everything looks.
24 Thanks, Helper. You know, I even feel better.
- 25 **HELPER:** We're not through yet.
- 26 **CHRISTY:** We're not? But everything looks great! The house
27 hasn't been this clean in years!
- 28 **HELPER:** What about your closet?
- 29 **CHRISTY:** *(Hesitantly)* The closet?
- 30 **HELPER:** Yes, the closet.
- 31 **CHRISTY:** You don't want to see my closet, believe me.
- 32 **HELPER:** But I do.
- 33 **CHRISTY:** *(Moves to block the door.)* Please, not the closet.
- 34 **HELPER:** But Christy, if we don't clean out the closet, all the
35 junk in there will soon spill out into your clean house.



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
